CFMS Field Trip-South Collecting Trip Lavic Siding near Barstow, CA

February 17th, 2018

This trip is open to all Rockhounds who agree to abide by the AFMS and CFMS Code of Ethics, the directions of the field trip leader and practice safe rock hounding.

Call the field trip leader beforehand for further information. Remember to sign in and out with the field trip leader. A Consent and Assumption of Risk Waiver of Liability form must be signed upon arrival at meeting site.

WHEN: Saturday February 17th at 8:00 AM

WHERE: Lavic Siding

MATERIAL: We will be collecting Agates and Jaspers.

MEET: Hector Rd off **I-40** on the south side for orientation and sign in. Waiver of liability will be signed at the meeting spot. From the meeting spot we will caravan for about 20 minutes to collecting site. Contact field trip leader for additional information.

VEHICLES: No low clearance vehicles, most will be able to make it to the main collecting area, there is an alternate spot for those with 4X4. Gas and food are available in Barstow.

WHAT TO BRING: Collecting bags/buckets, rock hammer, digging equipment, safety glasses and spray bottles, First Aid kit. Bring lunch, plenty of water and a camera; this widespread field offers no shade so use sun screen and protect yourself.

If you would like to stay for the weekend, this general area offers a wide variety of material so bring your rock collecting guides.

NOTE: This is the heart of the Mojave Desert and the weather can be unpredictable at this time of year so dress accordingly. This trip may be canceled at the last minute due to bad weather, so please feel free to contact us the night before if weather is questionable.

Treat the desert with respect - tread lightly and if you pack it in, pack it out.

INSURANCE: USING VEHICLES FOR SOCIETY BUSINESS

Here's the scenario: You are into the first day of a two-day society show.

One of your members is asked to drive his or her car on behalf of your society (e.g. moving supplies, doing errands, making coffee runs, etc.) and, while operating their vehicle, is involved in an accident and gets sued.

Clearly the driver needs to have adequate limits of liability coverage under his or her own car insurance policy (since the Federation's policy does not 'extend' any coverage to the owner or operator of a vehicle). But – who else is likely to be sued?

Correct – your Society and its members (just like an employer who gets sued because an employee is involved in an auto accident while on company time). Does your society have liability protection for such an accident and resultant lawsuit?

Well, maybe. If the rock and mineral society is not a member of the California Federation – then probably not, unless the society has gone out into the insurance market and purchased such insurance. However, if the rock and gem club is a member of the California Federation – then YES. Experienced defense attorneys and \$1 million of liability coverage would provide for the cost of legal defense of the society and its members under a benefit called Non-Owned Auto and Hired Auto Coverage. Neither the society nor its members would have to pay a lawyer to defend themselves (win-or-lose!), let alone the huge problem that would result if the Society was ordered to pay monetary damages!

Just think of those rock and mineral societies that 'go it alone' without belonging to the Federation. It's very likely that they may find themselves without this valuable coverage! This said, make certain that your society keeps its dues paid on time! This insurance coverage, and more, are paid through our annual member dues.

As our societies and clubs begin to plan for annual shows this year, remember that most venues will require proof that the society has liability insurance to protect the building owner in the event that there is damage to the building or that someone is seriously injured while on the owner's property. As long as the society is a member in

good standing of the California Federation, the society can obtain this proof of insurance. Further, if the function does not involve more than 500 participants or attendees, there is no charge whatsoever for having McDaniel Insurance Services issue such proof of insurance documents. A very nice benefit to us!

When you need to provide such proof of insurance you can find the forms on our Federation's website, www.cfmsinc.org. To avoid a charge for an expedited certificate please allow plenty of time in advance of your event!

CFMS SOCIETY PINS & BARS

SAFETY: TOOLBOX TALKS FOR THE ROCK AND MINERAL CLUB

In addition to having a written set of safety guidelines we must be able to communicate these to our members in a way that will not overload them. This second in our series of “toolbox talks” is designed so that a society’s president or safety coordinator can take it verbatim and give it to the membership. Alternately, it can be copied from the CFMS website and put on a society’s letterhead and distributed or made a part of a series of annual safety talks. It was just 3 ½ years ago that our president, Jennifer Haley, was caught at the center of the 6.0 Napa Earthquake and shared her experiences in the October, 2014 CFMS Newsletter. We are reminded that whether in California, Nevada or Hawaii, disasters can strike and we can survive easier until help arrives if we take some basic preparedness steps.

Toolbox Talk #2 — Earthquake Preparedness

Stock up now on emergency supplies that can be used after an earthquake. These supplies should include a first aid kit, survival kits for the home, automobile, and workplace, and emergency water and food. Store enough supplies to last at least 3 days.

First Aid Kit

Store your first aid supplies in slide-lock food storage bags. Store the bags in an easy-to-carry container, such as the Craftsman 13' Ballistic Nylon Tool Bag (\$7 at Sears or the combo with an 18" bag for \$13). Inspect your kit every January and keep it freshly stocked. NOTE: Important medical information and most prescriptions can be stored in the refrigerator, which also provides excellent protection from fires.

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For Your Automobile – you can’t get home due to road conditions

Assemble a survival kit for your automobile with the following items. Storing some of these supplies in a small bag with a shoulder strap or backpack will make them more convenient to carry if you need to walk

- ◆ What other items could be included in these safety preparedness kits?
- ◆ What are your immediate actions and priorities in the first 10-15 minutes?
- ◆ Discuss the need to consider storing supplies in several locations, including your workplace and other places you regularly spend time.
- ◆ What has been your experience in similar situations?
- ◆ Who is responsible for identifying and notifying family members about injuries and potential fatalities?
- ◆ Identify an out-of-state contact, such as a friend or relative, to notify when they are safe. In some cases it may be easiest to use social media and post a “They’re OK” message to many friends at once.

When you walk in the barn, to your immediate right is the beginning silversmith class. Through the ages silver and gold have always captured peoples interest. It has intrinsic value but more than that, a silversmith can take a flat piece of metal and turn it into a thing of beauty. This class sets you on the road to doing just that. Experienced instructors will guide you from how to hold a saw to cutting metal, working a torch, what solder does, the do's and don'ts of pickle (and what pickle is) to cleaning metal and polishing your finished piece. When you are done you have a piece of jewelry of which you can be proud.

Just beyond the beginning silver fabricating area is the advanced silversmithing taught by Ted who has exhibited amazing jewelry and really knows his stuff. This is where you earn your stripes as a silversmith. If you have taken beginning silver classes elsewhere this is your chance to polish those skills. (Pun intended.). In addition to Ted, your fellow students add to the collective information available...and not only in class. Countless times throughout the week you will find, get, and make opportunities to talk with other students about a jewelry problem you have or you may be a solution to someone else's problem. Camp Paradise is the answer place and the sharing place. You could wear a diamond tiara and no one looks askance at you. The first question they ask is, "Did you make that?" HAVING FUN – JUNIOR ACTIVITIES

One Great Source for Kids Booth Spinning Wheels!

Go to many local gem and mineral show that have a Kids Booth, and one of the things you'll most likely see (in addition to grab bags) is an activity that goes by a variety of names: a Spinning Wheel, a Wheel-of-Fortune, a Prize Wheel, etc. Basically, we're talking a roulette wheel the likes of which you'll see in Las Vegas—but unlike those in Vegas that are made to simply take money out of your pocket, the wheels in our Kids Booths offer a guaranteed rocky prize with every spin!

Many clubs have such a wheel, and most such wheels have been in the club for decades. In short, most are "clunkers." They are heavy, awkward to move and to store, and have seen better days in the time since they were first constructed and given a fresh coat of paint in 1952. Many of them are so off-balance that you can pretty much guarantee they'll always stop at the same two or three numbers on each spin.

If you have such a wheel—or if you're one of the few clubs that has never had such a wheel at an annual show—I've learned of a source that offers beautiful wheels that are light-weight, compact, and easily assembled and disassembled for convenient storage and transport. That source is Spinning Designs, 910 First Avenue, Asbury Park, NJ 07712. phone (732) 775-7050 web site www.SpiningDesigns.com.

They offer a basic "Off The Shelf" model that starts at just \$99 and that comes in varied sizes with colorful pre-made designs and a dry-erase surface so you can easily customize your wheel from show to show or for other club events. Or, if your club treasury is especially flush, you can get other, fancier models and designs in the \$300 to \$350 ranges—as well as a super-size model with "price available on request."
