Harvester Ants and Turquoise

New Mexico Magazine periodically publishes a wonderful book called *The Allure of Turquoise*, now in its second edition. Among the more unusual sections in this book is the relationship between harvester ants and turquoise.



Harvester ants in New Mexico are prolific collectors of turquoise. It is not unusual to see an ant carrying a tiny chunk of turquoise back to its nest. The ants use the heat retained by the turquoise after it has been exposed to the day's sun to stabilize the temperature in their nest at night by lining the "roof" with turquoise.

Harvester ants are quite picky. In one experiment hundreds of beads of all colors were scattered in a small area. The ants showed a strong preference for the blue and green beads, the colors of turquoise. A couple years after the experiment, scientists were still finding blue beads on nests.



Most archeologists are dismayed by this behavior, as it scatters Native American and Mesoamerican artifacts across the desert. At least one archeologist, however, has used the ants to zero in on a primitive site. He surveyed the area and found all of the ant nests that had turquoise on them. He concentrated on the area in the middle of the ant nests and found an ancient village in Chaco Canyon that had thousands of artifacts.

The bead experiment also provided interesting information about harvester ants. It had been assumed that all ants were blind. It is now believed that harvester ants have limited vision in the blue green spectrum.

If you find and disturb a harvester ant nest you can be sure of two things: one, there is likely to be an ancient site around; two, you are likely to be bitten. Harvester ants have one of the most toxic ant bites around, so be careful and realize you might be disturbing information valuable to archeologists.


September Show Meeting

OBSIDIAN TIPS & TRICKS

Safety Tip:

After obsidian is sawed, be sure to bevel the edges all around on your fine grinding wheel to keep them from flaking and chipping. Wear goggles or glasses at all times. If a small chip of glass (obsidian) got into your eye, it would be hard to remove as it is transparent and hard to see even with a powerful magnifying glass, and the edges may cut your eye before it could be removed.

Grinding Obsidian Cabs:

Approach your grinding wheel with the material at a slight horizontal angle. If brought straight in, it may be a “shattering” experience as obsidian fractures conchoidally, and this is a sure way to do it.

Polish on Obsidian:

Keep the polishing wheel wet. A dry polishing wheel will result in blisters and scratches.

Rare Footprints of Infant Dinosaur Discovered

Researchers at the Morrison Natural History Museum have discovered two rare hatchling dinosaur footprints in the foothills west of Denver, near the town of Morrison. The fossil footprints represent the first hatchling Stegosaurus footprints ever found according to leading paleontologist Dr. Robert T. Bakker the museum's curator of paleontology. Stegosaurus was first discovered in Morrison in 1877 and is Colorado's state fossil.

"The tracks are so crisply preserved that I can imagine the sound of tiny feet splashing up water when the baby dinosaurs came to this ancient river to drink and cool down," remarks Museum Director Matthew Mossbrucker, who found the tracks. "I still can't get over just how small these footprints are."

The tracks can be eclipsed by a fifty-cent piece, suggesting that hatchling Stegos were about the size of newborn human (babies). The fossils will go on permanent display at the Morrison Natural History Museum Memorial Day weekend as part of its annual "Dinosaur Days" event...

Abundant in natural history, the tiny foothills town of Morrison has yielded important fossils since 1877. Morrison Natural History Museum researchers began exploring the 150-million-year-old Jurassic rocks of the Morrison area in 2003 with support from Aggregate Industries, the Scientific and Cultural Facilities District, and the Association of Applied Paleontological Sciences. Coincidentally, 2007 marks the 130th anniversary of the first fossil finds in the area.

"If these dinosaurs were hatching in our modern world instead of 150 million years ago, they would be within sight of Denver's skyscrapers, " says Mossbrucker. "These infant dinosaur fossils have raised more questions than they have answered. We'll have to keep digging."
